WEEKLY MARKETS ROUND-UP

Executive Summary

26th June 2023

Top news: Russia and next week's Central Banks Forum — it will probably take a few weeks to understand the consequences of what happened in Russia on Saturday. What we can say for now is that the reaction of financial markets is rather muted to slightly defensive (equities sliding, Gold, Oil and Treasuries slightly up, Dollar flat, or a mix that faintly corresponds to geopolitical tensions). On the macro side, Chair Powell delivered a hawkish speech last Wednesday to the House Financial Committee, possibly hinting to 2 more rate hikes this year, while Flash Purchasing Managers Indexes (PMIs) widely deceived in the EuroZone on Friday, while holding up slightly better in the US. Next week, we will be awaiting the ECB's Forum on Central Banking Panel on Wednesday when ECB's Lagarde, FED's Powell, BoJ's Ueda and BoE's Bailey will discuss current and future policy. On Tuesday, we will also be expecting US Consumer Confidence data, on Thursday Final US Q1 GDP and on Friday, US PCE inflation data (the FED's favorite measure of Core Inflation).

Equity: last week, the EuroStoxx50 and the S&P500 dropped 3% and 1.5% respectively. We believe that an intermediate top is in the making, between Friday a week ago and the next 2 weeks. We are hence expecting some retracement into July, perhaps August, while the medium term upside potential also appears rather exhausted (see next page).

Fixed Income: the slight drop in US and EuroZone yields could continue slightly longer into early July. We then expect further upside into the Summer, yet some retracement back this Fall as most economic data could then be slowing.

FOREX: the US Dollar may hold up into early/mid July, perhaps as the FED continues its hawkish talk. Yet, for now, this rebound appears counter-trend and we would expect further lows into late Summer.

Commodities: Oil remains Oversold, yet the reaction to Saturday's failed coup in Russia will need a few days to be assessed as instability in Russia could impact Oil production either way. Gold should theoretically benefit from political instability, but remains under the pressure of a hawkish FED, possibly for another few weeks.

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Valuation focus: limited incentive to own equities going forward

3 graphs this week to explain why Equities seem rather fully valued medium term. Mega Cap Techs have accounted for the lion's share of US equity performance year-to-date. Their forward PE is looking rich once again at 30x (left-hand top graph). The rest of the S&P500 is nor cheap nor expensive (17x Median PE). Much of the rebound in US Equities was driven by Multiples Expansion (right-hand graph). There is limited scope for further such expansion as S&P500 earnings yield is now equal to less risky 3M Treasury and Investment Grade Bond yields (left-hand bottom graph).

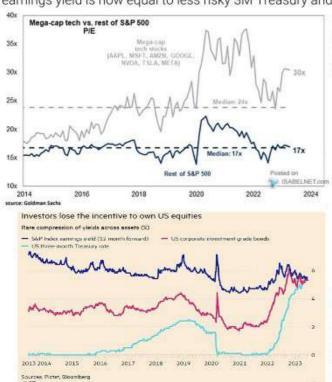
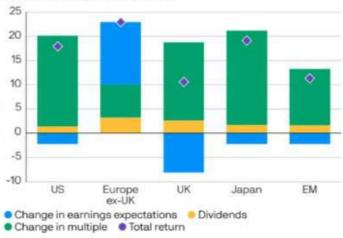


Exhibit 8: Multiple expansion has been the key driver of recent equity returns

Notes:

- Trend last 6 months: this Primis original algorithm, weighs the slope of the trend over the last 6 months vs the slope of the trend over the last 3 months yet factorised by the Fibonacci retracement ratio (0.618). Values are normalised using the average price over each period. If this combined slope is above +0.05% the trend is then "up", below -0.05% then "down", otherwise it is "neutral".
- 2. Overbought (OB) / Oversold (OS) measures: this Primis original algorithm is computed by comparing the difference between the 8 days moving average and the 100 days combined with the 3 days vs the 15 days one and normalises this difference by dividing it by the 1 year standard deviation (circa 260 open market days). Values above 225% or under -225% are Overbought "OB", resp. Oversold "OS", values above 100% or under -100% are "slightly OB", resp. "slightly OS", otherwise there is no relevant exaggeration and the situation is then "neutral".

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
